CONSERVATION NOTES

I am sure many of you participated in the Escondido Christmas Bird Count held on January 2nd. While it is a really fun thing to do it seemed important to look at how all of this benefits the birds. The data collected by observers allow researchers, conservation biologists, and other interested individuals to study the long-term health and status of our bird populations. When combined with other surveys, it provides a picture of how bird populations are changing.

The long-term perspective made possible by the Christmas Bird Count is vital for conservationists. It informs strategies to protect birds and their habitat, and helps identify environmental issues with implications for people as well.

In the 1980's CBC data documented the decline of wintering populations of the American Black Duck, after which conservation measures were put into effect to reduce hunting pressure on this species. More recently, in 2009, the data were instrumental in <u>Audubon's Birds & Climate Change</u> analysis, which documented range shifts of bird species over time. In 2007, the data were instrumental in the development of two Audubon State of the Birds Reports - <u>Common Birds in Decline</u>, which revealed that some of America's most beloved and familiar birds have taken a nosedive over the past forty years, and <u>WatchList 2007</u>, which identified 178 rarer species in the continental U.S. and 39 in Hawaii that are imperiled.

These three reports helped scientists and policy-makers to both identify threats to birds and habitat, and promote broad awareness of the need to address them, so a big round of thanks to everyone who went out and participated in the count!

Escondido Christmas Bird Count

Saturday, January 8, 8:30 a.m.

Dixon Lake

Escondido

(1110-C3) Rating: 2

From I-15 in Escondido, exit at El Norte Parkway and drive east approximately 3 miles. Turn left (north) on La Honda Drive and drive toward Dixon Lake and the Daley Ranch free parking area on your left. Meet at the east end of this parking lot, adjacent the Dixon Lake entrance.

Sweetwater River/Bonita

National City

(1310-C4) Rating: 2

Take I-15 south to I-805 south and take the Sweetwater Road exit in National City. Turn right at Sweetwater Road and then right at Plaza Bonita Road. You will see the Plaza Bonita Shopping Center parking area on the left. Meet at the far west corner of the parking lot near the Outback Steakhouse. Our walk will be along the Sweetwater River where we should see a good variety of waterfowl and other birds.

Head north on Highway 67 and just before you reach Ramona, make a hard right on Mussey Grade Road (heading southwest). Continue on Dos Picos Park Road ½ mile to the park entrance on the left. There is a San Diego County Park parking fee.

on Culver and turn left. At the first signal, which is Michelson, turn right. Continue on Michelson to the third signal, and then turn left on Riparian View and continue toward the Irvine Ranch Water District water treatment plant. Follow Riparian View and the signs directing you to Audubon, the Duck Club, and the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary. You will be on a paved 2-way road for a quarter of a mile. Before you encounter a gate that closes off the rest of the road, signs will direct you to turn right down a short hill and into a parking lot. The first building you see will be the Sea & Sage Audubon House. Beyond the Audubon House are the ponds of the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary and 10 miles of trail for us to explore. Allow 50 min. from Oceanside.

We will meet here and bird briefly around the center, then carpool to the vernal pools, and walk to the historic adobe Ranch House.


