# SANDHILL CRANE -CALIFORNIA BIRD OF THE YEAR



ne of California's favorite waterbirds is the 2012 Audubon California Bird of the Year. The Sandhill Crane received the designation after it received 43 percent of votes cast during an online poll this fall. Although the bird was a nominee for the past three years, it experienced a surge in popularity this year, going from 234 votes in 2009 to 5053 this year.

Audubon California is increasing the amount of Sandhill Crane habitat in California by partnering with private landowners. In the Central Valley, we're working with farmers and other conservation organizations to improve conditions for wintering cranes on working lands. For the last several years, we have also been identifying opportunities to create conservation easements for nesting Greater Sandhill Cranes on private land in the Surprise

Nearly 12,000 votes were cast in this year's Bird of the Year poll. The Sandhill Crane took the title with a late surge after the second-place Burrowing Owl raced off to an early start. Ultimately, the owl finished with 22.3 percent. Coming in third for the second year in a row was the Western Snowy Plover with 9.8 percent, while the Tricolored Blackbird followed with 8.1 percent.

Thanks to everyone who participated in this year's campaign by voting and rallying behind their favorite bird.



i, Everyone!

Thought you might like to see what some of our local groups are doing:

The Escondido Charitable Foundation announced recently

that the Reveal Escondido Creek proposal for the Plaza del Arroyo project will receive full funding. Reveal Escondido Creek (REC) is a coalition of volunteers and organizations. This project will unify the community of Escondido in new ways that build on old traditions. The waterway that was a natural place to gather in ancient times during the

homestead era will again bring people together in the 21st Century through arts, culture and recreation. Let's hope it also gives our birds a more friendly and natural waterway they can use in migration and/or permanent residence.

The Escondido Creek Conservancy has just completed a deal in partnership with The Conservation Fund, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the California Wildlife Conservation Board to take ownership of an incredible 240 acre tract of land, upland from Escondido Creek, along Harmony Grove Road and Via Ambiente. This property was destined for development with an approved County map so this is a tremendous win for the community and for our resident wildlife. Unfortunately, to save this land TECC had to commit to cover ongoing management costs. TECC has been very successful in acquiring land ahead of land developers. Come out to the Elfin Forest Interpretive Center...come on Thursday morning and you will get a special introduction from the docent on duty at the time...ME.

From I-15 in Escondido, exit at El Norte Parkway and drive east approximately 3 miles. Look for the "Daley Ranch/Dixon Lake" signs and turn left (north) on La Honda Drive. Continue toward Dixon Lake and the Daley Ranch free parking area on your left. Meet at the east end of this parking lot, adjacent the Dixon Lake entrance.

Take I-15 south to I-805 south and take the Sweetwater Road exit in National City. Turn right at Sweetwater Road and then right at Plaza Bonita Road. You will see the Plaza Bonita Shopping Center parking area on the left. Meet at the far west corner of the parking lot near the Outback Steakhouse. Our walk will be along the Sweetwater River where we should see a good variety of waterfowl and other birds.

Take I-5 north to the San Diego Freeway I-405, then exit on Culver and turn left. At the first signal, which is Michelson, turn right. Continue west on Michelson and then turn left on Harvard. Continue south on Harvard and then turn right on University Drive. Continue on University to Campus Drive and turn right again. Stay in the far right lane and immediately turn right on to Riparian View which will enter the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary. (There is a dark green sign by the turnoff, identifying this as the route into the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary) At the end of the road, you will make a sharp left turn down a steep driveway and into the parking lot. The first building you see will be the Sea & Sage Audubon House. Beyond the Audubon House are the ponds of the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary and 10 miles of trail for us to explore. Allow 50 minutes from Oceanside.

# 2013 GREAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT (2013 GBBC)

he 16th annual Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) will be held February 15-18, 2013. The GBBC is an annual four-day event that engages bird watchers of all ages in counting birds to create a real-time snapshot of where birds are across the U.S. and Canada. Please visit the official website at <a href="https://www.birdcount.org">www.birdcount.org</a> for more information.

Each checklist submitted by these citizen scientists helps researchers at the <u>Cornell Lab of Ornithology</u> and the <u>National Audubon Society</u> learn more about how birds are doing – and how to protect them and the environment we share. Last year, participants turned in more than 104,000 checklists online, creating the continent's largest instantaneous snapshot of bird populations ever recorded.

"This count is so fun because anyone can take part -- we all learn and watch birds together -- whether you are an expert, novice, or feeder watcher. I like to invite new birders to join me and share the experience. Get involved, invite your friends, and see how your favorite spot stacks up."

Anyone can take part in the Great Backyard Bird Count, from novice bird watchers to experts. Participants count birds for as little as 15 minutes (or as long as they wish) on one or more days of the event and report their sightings online at www.birdcount.org.



Pring life and song to your yard and garden by using native plants and a wildlife-friendly design. Mel's presentation demonstrates how you can make your California garden become a slice of our natural landscape that requires minimal maintenance, conserves water, and attracts wildlife. The presentation will serve to get you started on planning your own native plant garden – one that benefits both people and wildlife.

The key lies in having the right mix of native plants coupled with the three things all birds need: food, water and shelter. By using native plants that are adapted to our climate, you will have fewer insect and disease problems than with ornamentals and rarely will soil supplements be needed. Best of all, birds and butterflies are naturally drawn to these plants. A build-your-own solar powered birdbath - like the one used at the Cabrillo Monument - will also be on display.


**How to sign up:** This e-mail list is administered through Yahoo! Groups. There are essentially two ways for you to participate:

- As an unregistered user. In this case, all you get are the messages when they are sent. You will receive a confirmation e-mail. <a href="mailto:Don't reply to that confirmation">Don't reply to that confirmation</a> email or you will immediately be taken off the list. - As a registered Yahoo! user. If you have a Yahoo! mail account or belong to any other Yahoo! Groups as a registered user, this is the easiest and most powerful option: it allows you to read the archive of previous postings (seven year's worth) and to change your personal settings. 
I'd be the first to admit that I go on few or no walks, but we all do what we can.
