Our annual request for financial support continues and I wish to thank all those who have sent in contributions. For those who have not decided yet, remember that most of our members have National



Audubon memberships and Palomar Audubon receives less than \$3 a member from National. Please read the appeal letter and the article on San Diego Foundation's "Big Day" in this newsletter. Your contributions are 100% tax deductible.

In March, Trysten Loefke gave an impressive program on the Birds of England. For those who don't know, he is one of two teens we are providing scholarships so they can attend an ABA Youth Birding Camp in Colorado this summer. The other teen is Ryan Andrews. I'm proud that we are able to provide this opportunity, since they are both so deserving.

On April 12th I led a bird walk sponsored by the Escondido Creek Conservancy along a stretch of the Escondido Creek that flows through a concrete flood control channel. The Escondido Creek Conservancy hopes to build support to restore the creek to a natural environment. Several Board members recently met with the San Dieguito River Valley Conservancy and a biologist for the Pala Tribe about assisting them in bird surveys. These are examples of Palomar's strategy to partner with local conservation groups for the improvement of our community.

I wish to welcome our new members from Temecula. They recently became part of our chapter with the realignment of Audubon chapter territories for Palomar and San Bernardino Valley.

Remember that our program and meeting on May 22nd is when you'll have an opportunity to vote on the slate of Palomar Audubon Officers and Directors.

FIELD TRIPS Jim Beckman

Whether a seasoned birder or a beginner, you are welcome to join us. For more information call the trip leader shown below. Heavy rain cancels trips. Locations in Thomas Guide Coordinates are shown in parenthesis as (Page-Column Row). Ratings: 1=easy, suitable for all levels, 2=moderate, a bit more walking and possibly some hilly terrain, 3=challenging, longer hikes and may involve some steep terrain.

> Saturday, May 3, 8:00 a.m. Daley Ranch Escondido

(1110-C3) Rating: 2-3

From I-15 in Escondido, exit at El Norte Parkway and drive east approximately 3 miles. Look for the "Daley Ranch/Dixon Lake" signs and turn left (north) on La Honda Drive. Continue on toward Dixon Lake and on to the free Daley Ranch parking lot on your left. Meet at the kiosk.

Saturday, May 10, 8:00 a.m. Wilderness Gardens Preserve Pala

(409-E6) Rating: 2

This small wilderness area represents a fine example of oak woodland habitat. Meet in the Wilderness Gardens parking lot, which is about 10 miles east of I-15 on Highway.76, on the south side of the highway. Parking fee required, but free with senior County pass. Bring a lunch for an after-birding picnic. Expect warm weather. Leader: Michael Beeve

Saturday, May 17, 8:00 a.m.

Kit Carson Park

Escondido

(1150-C1) Rating: 1

From I-15 in Escondido, exit east on Via Rancho Parkway (which becomes Bear Valley Parkway) and drive about 1 mile to the Park Road entrance on your left – at the fire station. Proceed on Park Road about ³/₄ mile to the amphitheater parking lot on the right. Woodland, riparian, and open-area habitats usually get us a nice list of resident birds.

Saturday, May 24, 8:00 a.m. Lindo Lakes Lakeside

(1232-B3) Rating: 2

From North County, take I-15 south to Highway.52 east to Mission Gorge Road Turn left and continue east to

Woodside Avenue. Go under the Highway 67 overpass staying on Woodside Avenue (into Lakeside) to the end, with the parking area on the left. From San Diego, take I-8 east to Highway 67 north, and take the Riverford Road exit. After exiting, turn left on Woodside Avenue (into Lakeside) and continue to the end with the parking area on the left.

Saturday, May 31, 8:00 a.m. Sweetwater River Gorge Rancho San Diego (1271-J6) Rating: 2-3

From I-5, I-805, or I-15, take Highway. 94 east; stay on Highway. 94 as it becomes Campo Road, then turn right on Singer Lane, and then an immediate left onto the dirt parking area near the old steel bridge. This area is a rich stream habitat surrounded by native chaparral and sage scrub. There are no restrooms or drinking water available, so plan accordingly. Expect warm weather. **It's a PAS tradition to eat lunch at close-by Rubio's Fresh Mexican Grill after birding.**

Saturday, June 7, 8:00 a.m.

William Heise County Park/Santa Ysabel Mission Julian

(1156-C5) Rating: 2-3

From Escondido take Highway 78 east (from San Diego take Highway 67 east) to Ramona, then Highway 78 toward Julian, past Santa Ysabel. At Wynola start looking for the sign on your right for William Heise County Park (1 mile west of Julian). Turn right on Pine Hill Road and drive south for 2 miles to Frisius Road. Turn left (east) onto Frisius Road, and drive another 2 miles to the park entrance. We will meet in the parking lot. There is a parking fee, but free with a senior County pass. We will also drive to Santa Ysabel Mission to look for orioles and other spring/summer migrants. Bring a lunch for an after-birding piccie. Expect warm weather.

Saturday, June 14, 8:00 a.m. Cuyamaca Rancho State Park Julian (429- L3) Rating: 2-3

From San Diego, take I-8 east and exit north on Highway 79. Continue approximately 12 miles to the Paso Pacacho Campground on the left. From the North County, take Highway 78 (or Highway 67) to Ramona, and then continue on Highway 78 just past Julian, to Highway 79. Take Highway 79 south approximately 10 miles to the campground on the right where we will meet. There is a day use fee. Bring a lunch for an after-walk picnic. Expect warm weather. Saturday, June 21, 8:00 a.m. Agua Dulce Creek Laguna Mountains (430-B5) Rating: 2-3

We will meet at the old parking area for Agua Dulce Creek Group camp. Driving east on I-8, and after Pine Valley, look for signs indicating the Sunrise Highway Exit and Laguna Mountain Recreation Area. Go north on Sunrise Highway. (S-1) approx. 8 miles to Wooded Hill Road, the first road on the left and directly across the road from Morris Ranch Road. Restrooms, picnic tables and water are available in the Lagunas near the General Store at Burnt Rancheria Picnic area. A Forest Service Adventure Pass is required for day-use parking and is available locally in San Diego County at major sporting goods stores and at other areas in the Lagunas. <u>Bring a lunch for an after-walk picnic.</u> Expect warm weather. Saturday, June 28, 8:00 a.m. Palomar Mountain San Diego County (409-G7) Rating: 2

This field trip will start from the parking lot at Doane Pond. Leave the Escondido area before 7 a.m. From I-15, take Highway 76 east to Highway S6, north to Palomar Mountain. Or from Escondido, take Highway S6 to Palomar Mountain. At the mountaintop, at the S7 intersection stop sign, turn left and continue for 3 miles on State Park Road to the Palomar Mountain State Park entrance. There is a day use fee. Proceed 1¹/₂ miles to the Doane Pond/School Camp area. <u>Bring a lunch for an afterwalk picnic</u>. Expect warm weather.

Take I-8 east to the Lake Murray Blvd. exit (right turn) and proceed 1 mile north to Baltimore Drive. Turn left and drive about 1 mile to Jackson Drive. Turn left again, proceed ¹/₄ mile and make another left turn onto Golfcrest Drive. Continue about one mile on Golfcrest Drive to the Mission Trails Regional Park entrance on the left. Meet in the parking lot near the softball field bleachers. This location is at the northwest end of Lake Murray. Expect warm weather.

Trish Boaz "The Citizen Science Program"

Trish Boaz is currently the Executive Director of the San Dieguito River Valley Conservancy. She has over 25 years of experience with conservation and environmental programs. The San Dieguito River Park watershed consists of 94,000 acres with the goal of developing a 70 mile "Coast to Crest Trail" from Del Mar to Volcan Mountain near Julian. Over 75% of the River Park land is located in areas served by our Palomar Audubon Society. The goal of the San Dieguito Citizen Science Monitoring Program is to create a sustainable multiple species monitoring protocol specifically for the San Dieguito River Park that can be carried out by volunteer citizen scientists.

Dear Members and Friends,

A great **<u>BIG THANKS</u>** to those who have already responded to our 2014 fund raising letter. If you have not donated yet and no longer have the envelope from the last Band Tale mailing, please send your donation to the address above. The suggested donations are \$20 -Single, \$25- Family. \$55-Sponsor, \$100-Sustaining, and \$300 -Conserving. With Palomar Audubon now a part of the San Diego Foundation, you also have the option of donating to Palomar Audubon during their "BigDay" event on May 6. See article in Band Tale for more information on this event. PAS only receive about \$2 for every National Audubon membership.so your donations are our biggest funding source. You are helping make it possible for us to continue these programs.

Some of our accomplishments in 2013 and plans for 2014 are:

<u>BIRD WALKS</u>— We had 48 Saturday bird walks with over 900 participants. On average over 50 bird species were observed on each walk and all areas of San Diego County were visited. We continue to look for new areas to bird and to develop new walk leaders. Palomar Audubon is building a positive reputation for the variety, quality, friendliness and encouragement of new birders on its bird walks.

<u>PROGRAMS</u>— We had 7 programs on a variety of subjects presented at monthly membership meetings. Presenters ranged from experts in their field to PAS members.

<u>SCHOLARSHIP</u>— Trysten Loefke and Ryan Andrews are the recipients of the PAS 2014 Scholarship Awards. They will attend a week long ABA Young Birders Conference in Northern Colorado in July. Both of these 14-year old boys are excellent birders and very deserving of the scholarship.

<u>BIRD</u> COUNTS</u>— We participated in the Escondido Christmas Bird Count to gather yearly census in formation. PAS provided lunch for all the participants. We work to promote participation in The Great Backyard Bird Count and the recording of bird sightings in eBirds. We are working on projects to do bird counts for several scientific studies.

<u>PUBLICATIONS</u>—We continue to publish "Band Tales", our newsletter, which keeps our membership informed of our meetings, programs, weekly bird walks and items of environmental interest. We are now providing an Online color copy of "Band Tales" at our website. We completely redesigned our website last year and plan to add additional features this year.

ENVIRONMENTAL SUPPORT.— We donated to the following organizations in 2013: San Dieguito River Valley Conservancy, The Escondido Creek Conservancy (TECC) and Wilderness Gardens. We have prodded stuffed birds for display at the Elfin Forest Visitor Center. We plan to continue to support these organizations in 2014.

<u>BIRDING TRIPS OUTSIDE COUNTY</u>— We plan to continue offering these binding trips to our members. We had a very successful trip to Salton Sea in February.

We are successful as an organization only with your help. The **MAJOR** support for all of our programs and activities comes through your generous donations. If every one of our members donates only \$20. We can meet our financial goals and be able to continue to provide a vibrant and interesting organization for your enjoyment. REMEMBER THE DATE!

P alomar Audubon is partnering with the San Diego Foundation's Center for Charitable Giving for this year's <u>GIVE</u> <u>BIG</u> event. This is the first year that our organization has participated in this event and we will be one of 350 San Diego nonprofits that can receive donations through this program. The first Give Big event was launched in December 2011 and yielded over \$ 2,100,000 for the San Diego non-profits.



The San Diego Foundation has a distinguished history dating back to 1975 in providing leadership for effective philanthropy in San Diego County. It has had tremendous growth over the past 38 years and last year reported assets of \$620,000,000 and grants to the community of \$47,000,000 for fiscal 2013.

Palomar Audubon welcomes and encourages support from our members for this event. This year's on-line event will last from 12:00 AM until 11:59 PM on May 6, 2014. All contributions between \$25.00 and \$1,000.00 will help us receive part of the \$150,000 the Foundation has

committed to a pool that will be divided up by the non-profit organizations according to their success in obtaining contributions. We are also hopeful of establishing new relationships with donors who are not currently members of Palomar Audubon.

Because Palomar Audubon is an organization run exclusively by volunteers, our overhead is very low. This past year our administrative cost was less than 20 % of revenue. The remainder went to our education and environmental programs. These included our speaker's program, scholarship program, and support for other environmental programs. Currently, we are actively seeking out environmental programs that we think deserve support in the future. These include opportunities with the San Dieguito River Conservancy to complete the river park from "Coast to Crest." We are also supportive of other conservation organizations, such as The Escondido Creek Conservancy, Friends of Kit Carson Park, and Daley Ranch conservancy. We will keep you informed about any developments on this front.

Give Big is an on-line event that can be accessed through the San Diego Foundation website (<u>sdfoundation.org/givebig</u>.) Contributions must be by credit card, either MasterCard, Visa, or Amex. All donations are fully tax deductible and donors will receive an e-mail receipt. Unless you chose to be anonymous, your donation information will be forwarded to Palomar Audubon Society.

We are hopeful that our participation in this event will help us expand our conservation and educational programs to the benefit of all of our members and the north inland community by earning matching funds for our Chapter,
